This report is reflective of data from the most recent Shared Measures reporting cycle, which ran from July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022. For more information about the data that informed this report, please see the last page of this report.

The Early Childhood Shared Measures were collaboratively developed by Early Childhood Councils (ECCs), the Early Childhood Councils Leadership Alliance (ECCLA), and the Colorado Department of Early Childhood (CDEC) through the Local Organizational Capacity work of the Preschool Development Grant ([Colorado Shines Brighter Birth-Five Strategic Plan strategy 1.2.4](#)).

The purpose of the measures is to highlight the collective impact of ECCs on Colorado's early childhood system. Elevating this collective impact to policymakers, funders, and community members will establish a clear story of the value ECCs bring to their communities and the state.

The measures included in this report were developed utilizing the following guiding principles:

1. Balance activity with outcome
2. Strive for consistency and efficiency
3. Honor locally-selected measures
4. Vary targets to represent success
5. Support continuous and sustainable capacity, equity, and quality

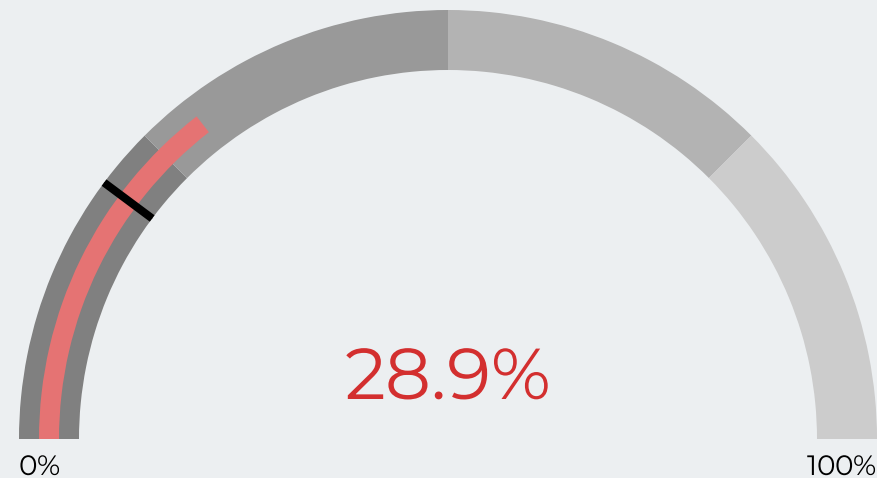

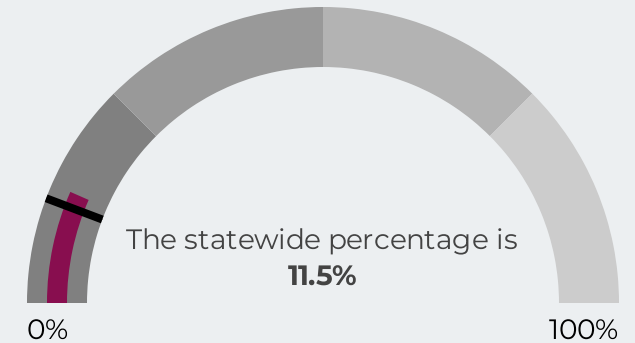

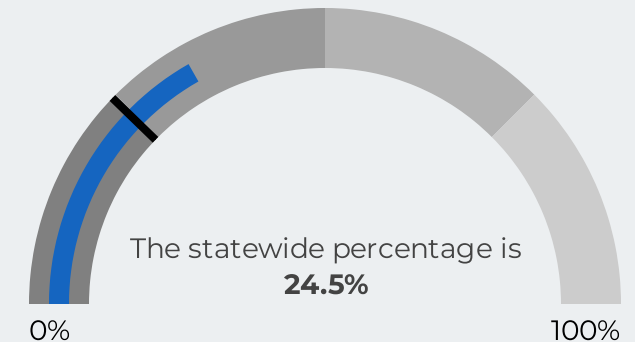

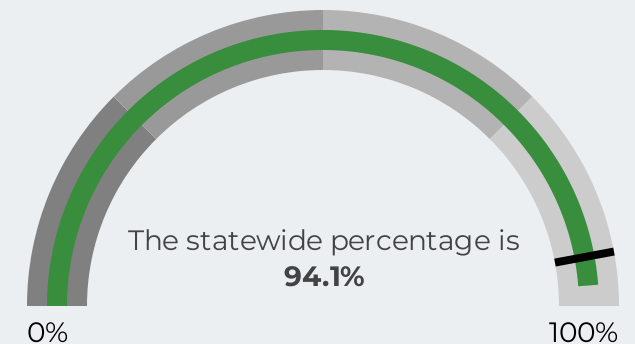

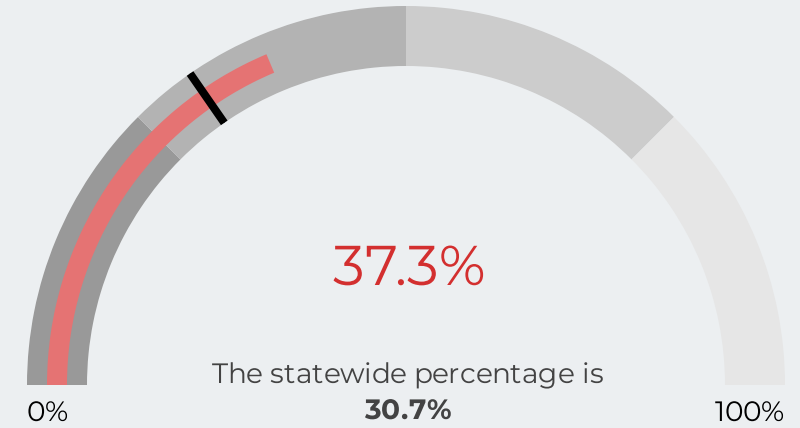

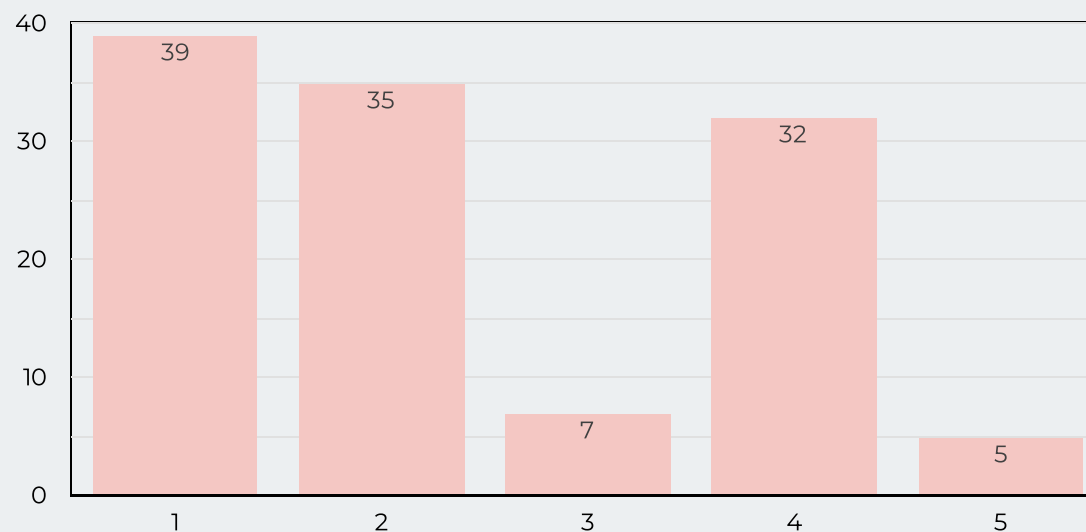

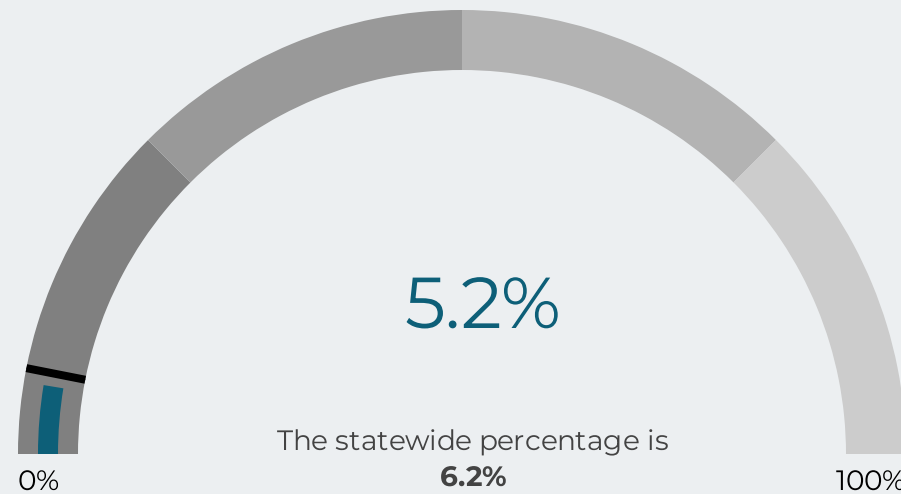

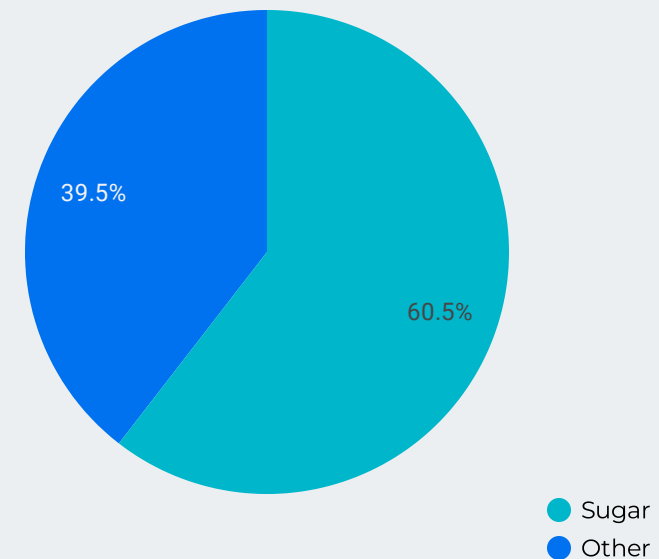

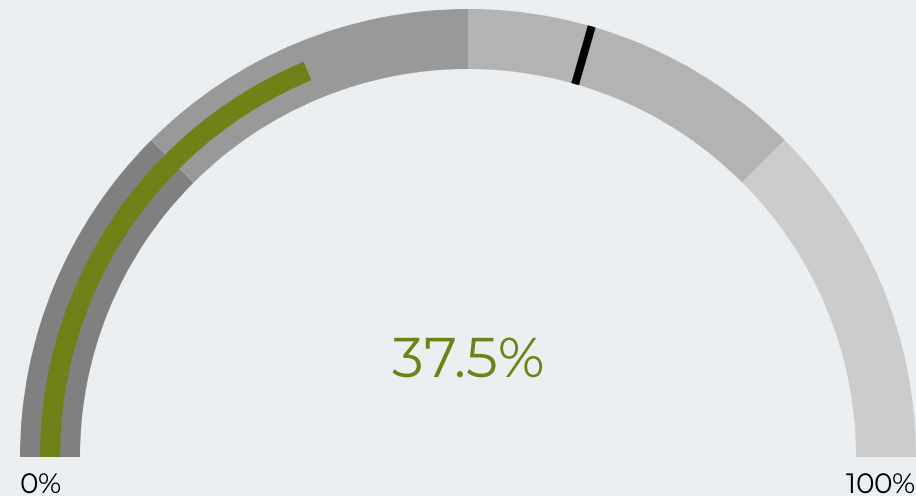

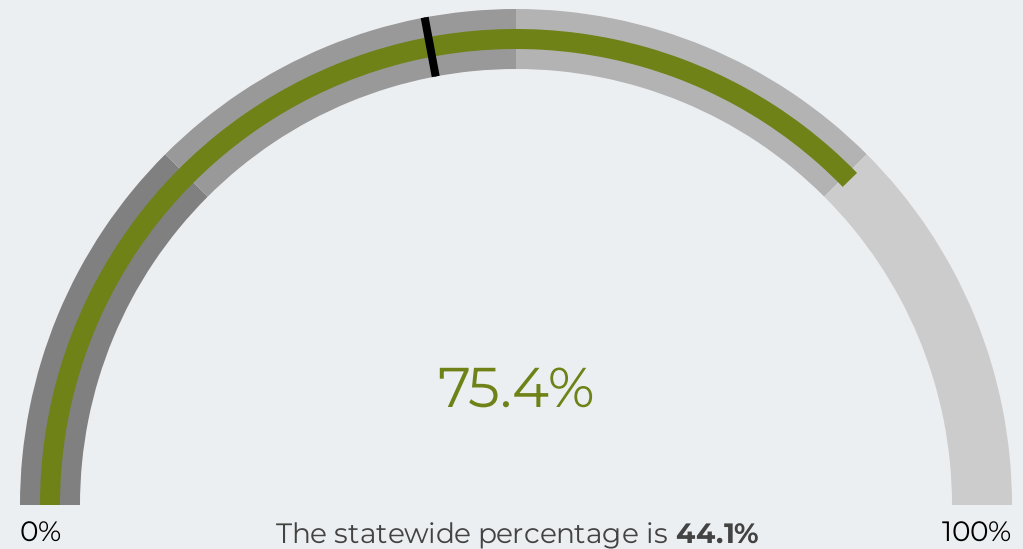

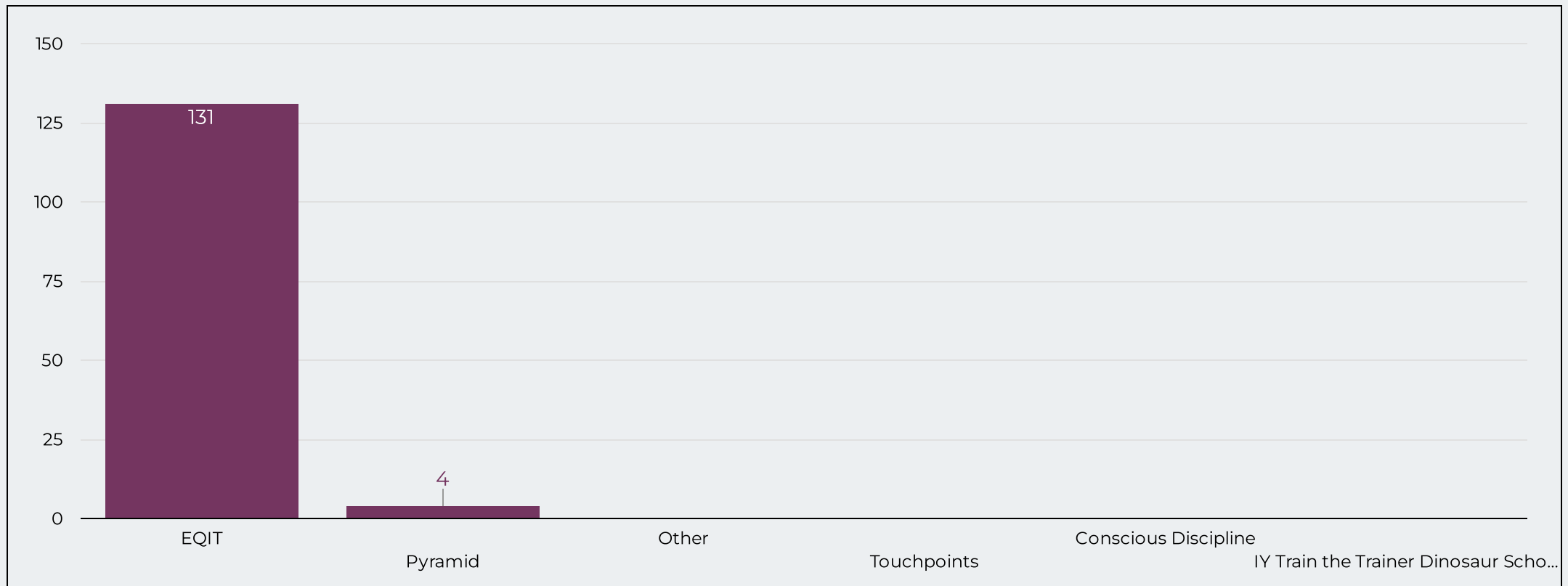

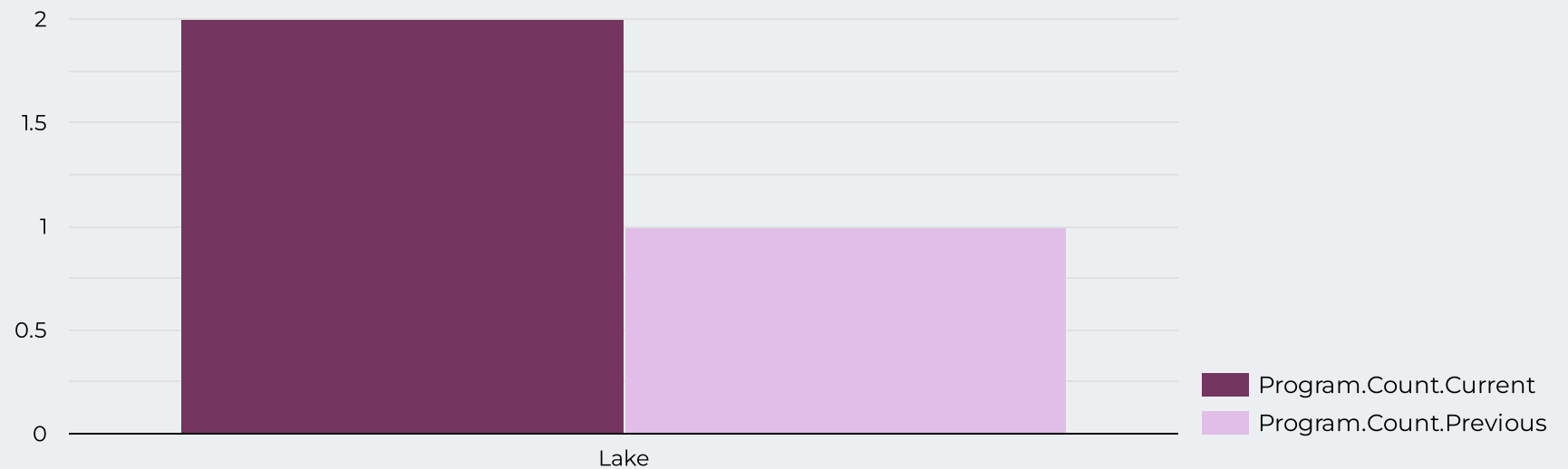

30 ECCs (88%, out of 34 ECCs), representing 55 counties (86%, out of 64) actively participated in this Shared Measures Report via the data collection survey. When CDEC was responsible for providing data, it was provided for all counties regardless of their participation in the survey and will show as an n size of 35 (34 ECCs and 1 unrepresented during the reporting period).

Below are the survey response rates (n size; question was answered) for the 30 actively participating ECCs. Participation in the Local Program Priorities was discretionary; as such, response rates were only calculated for Statewide Outcomes. Response rates were determined by calculating the number of ECCs who provided any data for any component of the Outcome. Please note: ECCs could have responded with "-1" (see next data note) so response rate is not an indication that the data provided by each responding ECC was used in the overall calculation.

In the event that an ECC was unable to access data to respond to a survey question, they were directed to enter a "-1". If an ECC entered "-1" for any question, they were counted in the response rate (n size) but the figure was changed to NA for any calculations so as not to subtract from other accessible data. If the data for a metric was inaccessible, or otherwise not provided, it will appear in the report as "No Data". The number of ECCs who indicated the relevant data was inaccessible is listed after the n size on each slide.

While we had high levels of participation by ECCs for this report, it is important to note that 4 ECCs (representing 8 counties) did not participate. Additionally, 1 county, Archuleta, was not represented by an ECC during the reporting period and is therefore not reflected in this report either. We should be cautious in using this report to make statewide generalizations given the incomplete representation of the data.

CDEC used the Colorado State Demographer's 2022 Forecast to estimate population data. This may not align with other resources used to estimate population.

CDEC used the Licensed Child Care Report pulled on 08-01-2022 to provide capacity, quality and provider volume data. This file can be accessed on the [Colorado Information Marketplace](#).
